







Discovery of the World – **Growing a Beanstalk**

- Materials:
- Cardboard Egg trays OR Recycled plastic cups
- Cotton wool
- Kidney beans
- Showcase cabinet to display the lifecycle of the growing plant

- 1. Line the plastic cup with cotton wool
- 2. Place the kidney beans on the cotton wool
- 3. Squirt with plenty of water







Growing a Beanstalk

Young toddlers learn best through handson activities and experiences. Growing a Beanstalk is a simple science experiment that enhances the children's fine motor skills and teaches them responsibility and patience.



Discovery of the World - Feel & Find (A Sensory Box)

Materials:

- Box with opening
- Objects: Faux owl, faux mouse, fake grass, pebbles, seeds, feathers, twigs, bird's nest, eggs, flowers/mushrooms
- Flashlight (with spare batteries)

- 1. Reach your hands into the box.
- 2. Find the object on the card using only your sense of touch.
- 3. Pull it out and show us the object
- 4. You can switch on the flashlight at the side of the box to see what other objects you can find in the box

Feel & Find (A Sensory Box)

We LOVE spending time outdoors and one way for young children to learn about the outdoors is through their senses. These sensory bins are a great way for children to learn using all five senses at once.




Language & Literacy – Pool Noodle Word Fun

- Materials:
- Pool noodles
- Plastic bins
- Index cards (recycle, reuse, reduce, plastic, metal, marine, love, green, grow, etc)

- 1. Look at the words on the index card
- 2. Hunt for the letters to spell the word
- 3. Spell as many words as you can! The one who spells the most words wins!



Aesthetic & Creative Expression - Hands on Hand Drum


Materials:


- Transparent recycled plastic bowls
- Colourful rubber bands
- Balloons



- 1. Get a strong and sturdy paper cup
- 2. Cover the lid of the cup with the balloon provided
- 3. Secure the balloon to the cup with a rubber band
- 4. Get creative and personalize your own drum with the stickers provided!







Hands On Hand Drum

Words consist of syllables – a unit of pronunciation comprising one vowel sound. Children can learn new words by listening to sounds using the rhythm of a drumbeat where each beat or sound represents a syllable. Learning new words can be so much fun! Children will get to make simple cup drums and use the drums to learn the sound of words!
