














It was once a canal with playful otters.












She sat on dry, broken land.








She walked across the dusty pathway.

Don't let the tap run when washing the dishes.

Fill a bucket with water and use it to rinse off dirty dishes before soaping. You can also use a bucket of clean water to rinse off soapy dishes instead of washing them directly under a running tap!

Dishwashers can significantly reduce water usage.

You can help conserve water!

Use a bucket with a wring-top to fill water before mopping floors. These buckets prevent the need to open the tap every time you want to clean and wring the mop.

Removing your shoes and washing your feet before entering the house can help trap less dirt and grime onto the floors!

Wipe up spills immediately for an easy clean-up and to prevent stains from drying up.





Opt to take a standing shower instead of drawing water into a bath tub. Or fill a bucket with the water you need before taking a bath.

Limit your bathing time to under 5 minutes.

Sing and dance to your heart's content with the water turned off!

Do you have more ideas on how you can help conserve and reuse water?

Reuse water from washing rice and vegetables to water plants in your garden.

You can collect rain water in buckets to water the plants!
